(a) Part B – Behaviours

- i. ensuring principles of natural justice can be adequately upheld in all circumstances;
- ii. training opportunities that will assist Council Members determine complaint outcomes under Part B;
- iii. development of a template Complaints Management Policy;
- iv. reconsider the purpose of allowing 'any person' to make a complaint;

Item 5.5

Detailed Financial Ratios

The recommended indicators to the financial ratios be referred to the Department of Local Government, Sport and Cultural Industries and the Office of the Auditor General for consideration;

a) Operating Surplus Ratio

A key indicator of a Local Government's financial performance is the Operating Surplus relative to the operating revenues. A benchmark result of 0% or greater is considered acceptable. Advanced is 15% or above.

b) Debt Service Coverage Ratio

A Local Government's ability to service debt is measured by the "Debt Service Cover Ratio". This is the measurement of a local government's ability to produce enough cash to cover its debt payments. A Basic standard is achieved if the ratio is greater than or equal to 2. An Advanced standard is achieved if the ratio is greater than 5

c) Asset Sustainability Ratio

Measures capital expenditure on renewal or replacement of assets, relative to depreciation expense. Standard is met if the ratio can be measured and is 90% (or 0.90) Standard is improving if this ratio is between 90% and 110% (or 0.90 and 1.10)

d) Current Ratio

Liquidity refers to how quickly and cheaply an asset can be converted into cash. A Local Government's liquidity is measured by the "Current Ratio". This ratio provides information on the ability of a Local Government to meet its short-term financial obligations out of unrestricted current assets. Standard is met if the ratio can be measured and is at least 90%. Standard is improving if this ratio is between 90% and 110%.

e) Net Financial Liabilities Ratio

An indicator of the extent to which the net financial liabilities of a Local Government can be serviced by its operating revenues. Target < 60% per annum.

Item 5.12

Detail for single residential building approval process.

Matters to be addressed in consultation with the Local Government sector:

a) Prior to any regulatory changes, a review of the building fees and charges is essential, to ensure that any costs associated with the approval of building work,

implementation of mandatory inspections, compliance and enforcement actions, and record keeping requirements for the Local Government sector, will result in full cost recovery

- b) The Independent Building Surveyor who signed the Certificate of Design Compliance should be responsible for undertaking the inspections, therefore, Local Government would not be solely responsible for mandatory inspections
- c) The State Government's registration process for the Builder should be strengthened to ensure that the builder fulfils their obligations for compliance with the National Construction Code
- d) Implementation of mandatory inspections should be undertaken by properly qualified and independent personnel, at the following stages (at a minimum) of the construction process
- 1. Foundations and footings
- 2. Slab/reinforcement of bearers/joists
- 3. Waterproofing
- 4. Roof, and
- 5. Occupancy or final completion
- e) The occupancy or final completion inspection must ensure that the bushfire construction and energy efficiency requirements have been complied with, and
- f) The removal of the proposed 'fast track approval' concept, as is not warranted nor properly justified as an improvement option.

WALGA develops an annual state budget submission and this year there are four strategic themes:

- 1. Empowering Local Governments to contribute to the State's priorities;
- 2. A strategic approach to economic development in WA;
- 3. Investing in important Local infrastructure; and
- 4. Ensuring a sustainable environment for our communities.

Across these four themes, WALGA has put forward 18 initiatives totalling \$287 million across the four year forward estimates period, with \$94 million of this spend recommended in 2020-21. The bulk of the expenditure relates to infrastructure upgrades, including \$95 million over four years for the replacement of mercury vapour street lights.

- 1. Provide sufficient funding and resourcing for the drafting and development of the new Local Government Act.
- 2. Conduct an Inquiry to review Local Government responsibilities and income sources.
- 3. Provide funding for Elected Member Universal Training.
- 4. Develop and implement a Framework for Regional Development.
- 5. Pilot a place based, localised approach to regional economic development.

Logistically, Broome is WALGA's preferred option for the two-day event due to flight scheduling considerations.

The responsibilities for the host Shire include coordination of local transportation, accommodation, venue and catering for approximately 35 WALGA attendees along with any Kimberley Country Zone representatives.

A Zone Forum is held on the first day with a request for representatives of each of the six Shires in the Zone to present on their Local Government priorities, issues and any matters of interest to WALGA. Based on the program delivered in Shark Bay in 2019, the presentations are approximately 20 minutes each.

WALGA has advised, contingent upon the number of Kimberley Country Zone representatives that they may seek funding to cover catering for those delegates. For clarity, this means that if there are 15 Kimberley Country Zone representatives in addition to the 35 WALGA representatives, there would be an obligation to pay the catering costs for those representatives.

It is estimated that an allowance of \$2,250 should be made to allow for catering for Zone representation to the September 2020 WALGA Regional meeting, with that amount revised as the number of representatives is confirmed closer to the date. The cost estimation is based on \$90 for dinner, \$15 each for morning and afternoon tea and \$30 for lunch, with 15 representatives: three from each Shire in the Kimberley; one each from the Shires of Cocos Keeling Island and Christmas Island; and one secretariat support. Costs would be invoiced back to member Councils by the Secretariat.

SUMMARY: WALGA is seeking a Kimberley Zone Representative for the Stakeholder Working Group for the consideration of the proposed alternative to the CA07 Restricted Access Vehicle Operating Condition.

BACKGROUND

At the December 2018 meeting State Council resolved that WALGA:

- Opposes withdrawal of the "Letter of Approval" Restricted Access Vehicle Operating Condition until an acceptable alternative to Local Government is developed;
- Supports the position that Local Governments not use provision of the Letter of Authority to charge transport operators to access the Restricted Access Vehicle network;
- 3. Supports the development of standard administrative procedures including fees and letter formats;
- 4. Supports the practice of Local Governments negotiating maintenance agreements with freight owners/ generators in cases where the operations are predicted to cause extraordinary road damage as determined by the Local Government; and
- 5. Advocates to Main Roads to establish a stakeholder working group to develop an appropriate mechanism through which the increased infrastructure costs from the use of heavy vehicles and those loaded in excess of limits (concessional loading) can be recovered from those benefiting and redirected into the cost of road maintenance.

COMMENT

Main Roads are proposing an alternative to the CA07 condition which will replace the condition with a notification process. They are presenting the proposal to all Regional Road Groups and have requested Local Governments provide feedback through an online survey.

WALGA is establishing a stakeholder working group to advise if the proposal is "an acceptable alternative", or to recommend amendments to Main Roads WA and to advise a policy position for State Council consideration.

In accordance with the State Council resolution each Zone has been invited to nominate a representative to serve on the working group. The closing date for nomination is 4 December 2019. The request was circulated for member consideration.

SUMMARY: The Commonwealth has released its consultation draft on the Drought Resilience Funding Plan with submissions on the draft Plan closing on the 13 December 2019.

COMMENT

The Future Drought Fund (FDF) is a key aspect of the Australian Government's drought policy, which seeks to provide a permanent and secure revenue source to build drought resilience.

The Fund begins with an initial credit of \$3.9 billion. Earnings will be reinvested until the balance reaches \$5 billion (expected in 2028-29). From 1 July 2020, \$100 million will be made available each year to support Australian farmers and communities. Funds can be used to prepare for, and become resilient to, the effects of inevitable future drought.

The FDF will support initiatives that enhance the drought resilience of Australian farms and communities by becoming more prepared to respond to the impacts of drought.

The Drought Resilience Funding Plan is a high-level framework that seeks to ensure a coherent and consistent approach is undertaken when considering and providing funding for drought resilience projects including investing in:

- research and innovation
- research adoption and extension
- adopting new and existing technology
- improved environmental and natural resource management
- local and regional infrastructure and community initiatives.

The final design of the fund, and the determination of eligible criteria for fund, will be informed by the consultation phase.

WALGA encourages Local Governments to complete an online survey before the closing date on 13 December and provide WALGA with a copy of the submission before the 6th December.

At it's 9 October 2018 Joint Meeting the KRG received the Annual Financial Statement for the period ending 30 June 2018. The statement included a carry-forward surplus of \$292,216.

The 2019/20 KRG Annual Budget was adopted at the 30 April 2019 Joint Meeting. The Annual Budget was adopted with a \$120 surplus.

COMMENT

The 3 December 2019 Agenda includes an item requesting that the KRG receive and endorse the Annual Financial Statement for the period ending 30 June 2019. The Annual Financial Statement for the period ending 30 June 2019 includes a carry-forward surplus of \$302,610.

The KRG 2019/20 Adopted Budget included the following carryover projects:

- 1. \$5,000 Kimberley Land Tenure Project
- 2. \$66,000 Tanami Road Business Case.

Additional carryover projects identified through the Annual Financial Statement include the following items:

- 1. \$36,000 carryover for the Kimberley Volunteer Strategy which is due too be completed in December 2019.
- 2. \$10,000 carryover for ICT and Office 365 Improvements not completed in 2018/19 but required in 2019/20.

The KRG 2019/20 Annual Budget has been adjusted to recognise these additional carryover projects.

Budget Adjustments

Following the adoption of the KRG Budget for 2019/20 the group recognised the need to contribute funds to Alcohol Management Initiatives in lieu of available grant funding. At the 6 August 2019 Joint Meeting the group endorsed a \$100,000 allocation of funds from surplus to implement a software system to monitor and report on takeaway alcohol. This has resulted in a \$100,000 reduction to operating income and a corresponding \$100,000 surplus reduction.

The 2020 State Budget submission for the Kimberley Regional Group is based on five priorities which are summarised below:

 - Ongoing replacement of single lane bridges on the Great Northern Highway;

 - Implementation of the funded upgrades to the Duncan Road;

SUMMARY: The Kimberley Regional Group (KRG) is a Platinum member of the not-for profit Savannah Way Ltd at a cost of \$5,500 per annum. The organisation offers a tourism coordination and promotional service across the north of Australia. This item provides an update on the current status of Savannah Way Ltd.

BACKGROUND

Previous Considerations

COMMENT

The KRG is a Platinum Member of Savannah Way Ltd, which was established to promote the "Savannah Way" which encompasses roads from Cairns in Queensland, through Katherine in the Northern Territory, and through the Kimberley along the Great Northern Highway. The reason for the membership was to promote tourism opportunities across the Kimberley into new markets.

The major promotion is through the website, savannahway.com.au, which is now old infrastructure and is not attracting high visitation by potential tourists. Concern has been expressed about the value for money of the \$5,500 annual investment.

Savannah Way Ltd has been contacted for feedback and have stated that they are currently working through a new direction with a strong focus on digital activities and engagement with industry, operators and other groups to bring together resources to build the Savannah Way as Australia's most adventurous drive.

Key projects include:

- redevelop the website www.savannahway.com.au including more content;
- imagery and links to operators / other resources;
- social media campaign to build a strong digital presence;
- itineraries including neighbouring regions and townships that are only accessible via the Savannah Way drive route; and
- an engagement strategy to increase input from members and partners with content, imagery and sharing of corporate information.

Other initiatives include the ongoing distribution of the Savannah Way brochure; family focused opportunities; grant funded activities for specific projects and industry development through workshops and online resources.

The return on investment for membership of the Savannah Way is currently limited and feedback received indicates the program is currently not highly regarded by tourism operators as a visitation generator.

The incoming CEO of Savannah Way Ltd has recognised the deficiencies and has approached Queensland local governments with a proposal to get their support for the new "Drive North Queensland" project.

The return on investment for Stage 1 of the proposed project "Drive North Queensland" is outlined as follows:

- Create a network both on-line, and through developing operator and industry
 partnerships and relationships that improves (primarily) consumer access to information
 and product to improve their experience of the destination. This will increase interest,
 intention and purchase and can be measured through Tourism and Events
 Queensland visitor statistics.
- Operate successful marketing initiatives to increase visitor length of stay and spend.
 Each stage or element of the project will have its own objective measurement. Tourism Queensland and the RTOs will work together to collate individual indicators (like expenditure, number of transactions, length of stay, etc) and measure overall impact and success.
- Increase the participation of operators and stakeholders in tourism marketing and development activity. This will be achieved by creating cost effective access to targeted campaigns and building the network's cooperative strength to add value to all associated route and destination brands. The success of this objective will be measured by the uptake of cooperative activities.
- Disperse the benefits of combined marketing impact to smaller communities and operators as well as regional centres. This will be through the program's emphasis on drive linkages rather than single destinations.
- Develop ownership from all partners to ensure the overall vision to develop Drive Northern Australia under the well-established brand of Savannah Way.

Once up and running it is envisaged that the project will be moved into the NT and WA however no timeframe has been articulated.

For consideration by the Kimberley Regional Group are the short, medium and longer term benefits of remaining a Platinum member of Savannah Way Ltd for an annual fee of \$5,500.

Should membership be discontinued in to the future, the budget will need to be adjusted in relation to both the Savannah Way Ltd membership and approved project 0405241 – Savannah Way Business Case Implementation Plan.

SUMMARY: An Advocacy Agenda is an important tool when making representation on matters where funding, legislative and or policy changes are required. It provides context to priorities and requests and underpins State and Federal budget submissions.

This report presents a proposed Kimberley regional group (KRG) Advocacy Agenda for consideration.

COMMENT

An Advocacy Agenda has been developed to capture the priorities for 2020 identified in the KRG Business Plan and the KRG Position Statements. To enable a breadth of interests, priorities have been clustered as outlined below:

1. Supply Chain Resilience

Funding for the Tanami Road corridor – with work to commence in 2020 to a standard that facilitates quad road train access, upgrades to Great Northern Highway including single lane bridges, and in-situ Australian Quarantine and Inspection Service facilities.

2. Global Market Access

Supporting the development of port logistics including facilitating private investment, efficient management of approvals processes and consideration of additional project revenue through loans and grants.

3. Addressing Anti-Social Behaviour

Facilitating the reduction in alcohol related harm through better alcohol management across the Kimberley including bulk alcohol tracking, banned drinkers register and legislation to support Police disrupting sly-grogging, and sustainable funding streams for youth programs.

4. Growing Tourism

Supporting and contributing to ensure resilient access including the extension of the Kununurra runway and the floating dock in Broome to service the cruise tourism sector.

5. Youth Employment

Funding to support "employment guarantee" programs for year 12 school leavers in remote local government areas.

6. Improved Waste Management

Ensuring that a basic level of infrastructure is available to manage waste, such as weighbridges, regardless of the level of disadvantage experienced in a local government area. Support and contribute to lifting the capability of local authorities to achieve minimum waste management service levels as outlined in the WA Governments Waste Avoidance and Resource Recovery Strategy 2030.

7. Affordable Energy

The Uniform Tariff Policy is vitally important for residential customers connected to the grid, the moratorium on solar energy due to capacity constraints must be addressed.

For business both on and off the grid, the cost of power can be a major barrier to investment and should be investigated by the State Government, with grant funding for small solar installations, such as pumps, made available.

8. Fit for Purpose Taxation

It is essential that current remote taxation concessions are not eroded. Further, the State Government can leverage discrete payroll and stamp duty concessions for stimulus in rural and remote areas.

9. Telecommunications

Blackspots along the Great Northern Highway are an unacceptable risk, both in the tourist season and in the wet. An upgrade program must continue to be rolled out.

NBN must be reticulated in urban centres when in proximity. It is unacceptable that towns are bypassed when the infrastructure is on the doorstep.

10. Building Our Tomorrows

Funding to improve amenity, such as the Building Better Regions Funding, must be available to support remote and disadvantaged communities to attract and retain people and maintain economic viability.

SUMMARY: This item provides an update on the Disaster Relief Funding Arrangements (DRFAWA) Business Case and the response from the Minister for Emergency Services, the Hon Fran Logan.

BACKGROUND

The review of the Western Australia Natural Disaster Relief and Recovery Arrangements (WANDRRA) and the subsequent establishment of the DRFAWA was considered by Shires as an opportunity to streamline cost effective treatments after extreme events such as cyclones, floods and bushfires.

At the meeting on the 10th June, the Kimberley Regional Group (KRG) resolved to write to the Minster for Emergency Services and to develop an issues paper/case study concerning the application of DRFAWA funding as it has not met the expectations of Local Governments in the Kimberley.

Previous Considerations

Joint Meeting 11 June 2019 Item 11.1

COMMENT

The review of the WANDRRA and the subsequent establishment of the new DRFAWA was considered by many Shires as an opportunity to streamline cost effective treatments after extreme events such as cyclones, floods and bushfires. The funding was to comprise three aspects being:

- immediate construction works;
- essential public asset reconstruction; and
- a mitigation fund for new mitigation projects.

The initial two stages are useful in many circumstances and allow for managing one-in-one hundred year events, however this Case Study focuses on the one-in-ten-year events, with some infrastructure damage in the region occurring even more frequently. The mitigation

fund for upgrades to improve resilience is an essential component of the DRFAWA and is critical for ensuring business continuity and ongoing access to remote communities.

The KRG resolved to develop a case study. The final case study covers the five-year DRFAWA submission period 2014-2019 and uses the Dampier Peninsula to highlight the level of repair duplication that has occurred during that time. As far as possible specific areas of damage and repair have been matched to identify opportunities for policy improvement.

Katherine Clarke, Principal Policy Officer – Disaster Recovery Funding Arrangements, Resilience and Recovery, Department of Fire & Emergency Services will be attending the KRG meeting to provide an update on the funding, including the funding pool for betterment.

SUMMARY: Main Roads has written to the Kimberley Regional Group (KRG) seeking endorsement of the nominated Roads of Strategic Importance (ROSI) road projects and proposed ROSI funding allocations.

COMMENT

Main Roads have written to the KRG seeking endorsement of the nominated ROSI road projects and associated proposed indicative ROSI funding allocations.

Road infrastructure upgrades have been a priority for the KRG which undertook a delegation in February 2019 and again in November to confirm the priorities with Ministers and funding agencies.

ROSI funding was announced by the Federal Government in 2019 for the Tanami Road, Duncan Road (including Gordon Downs Road), and upgrades to the Great Northern Highway.

ROSI projects require a 20% contribution from the State Government.

The following summary provides further information on the identified projects within Kimberley Region:

- 1. <u>Great Northern Highway Upgrades</u>
- (i) Great Northern Highway Upgrade 2171slk 2186slk (Broome to Derby)
 - Widen and Overlay approx. 14km section of highway
 - Total Project Cost \$12.5M
 - ROSI Allocation \$10.0M
- (ii) Great Northern Highway 2922slk 2950slk (Ord River North)
 - Reconstruct 18km of highway and upgrade 2 single lane bridges
 - Total Project Cost \$98M
 - ROSI Allocation \$37.26M

Note: the current funding allocation for the Ord River North project will be insufficient to meet full project costs.

In addition, the Port Hedland Airport Deviation – Great Northern Highway, has been listed however is outside of the remit of the KRG as it is located in the Pilbara.

- Construct Realignment
- Total Project Cost \$36.0 million
- ROSI Allocation \$22.74M

2. Alice Springs to Halls Creek (WA side of the border)

- (i) Duncan Road and Gordon Downs Road Upgrade (Halls Creek to Ringers Soak)
 - Upgrade road and drainage including sealing flood-ways and gravel sheeting
 - Total Project Cost \$51.0 million
 - ROSI Allocation \$40.8M
- (ii) Tanami Road Upgrade (initial funding)
 - Commence upgrading and sealing of Tanami Road
 - Project Cost \$42.75M (funded amount only total project cost unknown).
 - ROSI Allocation \$34.2M

Combined Total Funding for funding Item 3 is \$93.75M - Commonwealth \$75M, State \$18.75M.

The amounts for the Tanami Road/Duncan Road corridor are consistent with previous State and Federal Government announcements however the scope of works associated with the \$87.5million funding listed in the state budget for works on Great Northern Highway between Broome and Kununurra has now been expanded to include the Port Hedland Airport Deviation Road in the Pilbara. Previous funding announcements are listed below:

WA State Budget Announcement 2019 (Snapshot attached).

- \$51 million towards the Ringer Soak and Northern Minerals Access Road in Browns Range (Duncan Road)
- \$42.7 million to upgrade Tanami Road
- \$87.5 million to upgrade Great Northern Highway from Broome to Kununurra

Announcement issued by the State Government on 20 November 2019 re-Federal Government project funding "brought forward".

- \$36.2 million for the Alice Springs to Halls Creek Corridor Upgrade Funding to flow immediately and over the next six financial years to enable the commencement of works in 2020 after the majority of funding previously being allocated beyond 2022-23. Australian Government contribution to the project is \$75 million (\$36.2 million brought forward); Western Australian Government contribution to the project is \$18.75 million.
- \$40.8 million for the Newman to Katherine Corridor Upgrade. Funding to flow immediately and over the next four financial years to enable the commencement of works by 2020 after the majority of funding previously being allocated beyond 2022-23. Australian Government contribution to the project is \$70 million (\$40.8 million brought forward). Western Australian Government contribution to the project is \$17.5 million.

Main Roads is seeking the endorsement of the Kimberley Regional Group, representing the Local Governments in the Kimberley Region, of the nominated road projects and associated proposed indicative ROSI funding allocations.

The funding will provide considerable benefits across the Kimberley however there appears to be some potential inconsistency with funding announced previously for the Great Northern Highway which may need to be clarified.

SUMMARY: A Discussion Paper was prepared by the Department of Health on Management Public Health Risks Associated with pesticides in Western Australia. WALGA provided a response, with input from the Kimberley Regional Group.

BACKGROUND

COMMENT

A Discussion Paper was prepared by the Department of Health (DoH) on Management Public Health Risks Associated with pesticides in Western Australia. The objective of the review is to ensure appropriate measures are put in place to minimise public health risks associated with the use of pesticides in Western Australia. In total there are nine proposals being:

- Proposal 1: continue registration under the Public Health Act;
- Proposal 2: continue licensing under the Public Health Act;
- Proposal 3: licensing exemption criteria for individuals:
 - Expanding licensing criteria for individuals on land owned or occupied by that person;
 - Pesticide licensing exemption criteria for individuals employed exclusively by local government authorities and State government departments;
 - o Removing licensing exemption criteria for individuals employed exclusively by local government authorities and State government departments.
- Proposal 4: the control of the use of pesticides in public places (this item relates to minimum lettering dimensions, vehicles to display flashing yellow warning lights during spraying in public places);
- Proposal 5: provide controls for safe fumigations under the Public Health Act;
- Proposal 6: provide controls for management of registered pesticides (this proposal considers secure storage, labelling, safe use and disposal of containers);

- Proposal 7: local government replacing DOH as the enforcement agency (this is a
 response to the logistical challenges experienced by DoH which includes the
 inspection of vehicles and premises in regional areas. A fee can be charged under
 the Act for this service. In the Kimberley there are 14 businesses, 39 pest
 management technicians and 2-4 vehicle inspections. Changes to the status quo
 are likely to have a significant impact on resources);
- Proposal 8: variable frequency of renewal for registrations and licences (up from 1 year to 3 years in response to industry requests);
- Proposal 9: introduce substance management plan (SMP) requirements. (It is
 proposed that all individuals exempt from licensing that use restricted (e.g.
 Schedule 7) chemicals be required to develop a SMP due to the risk level of risk of
 the chemicals being used. The SMP are proposed to have a lifespan of 5 years).

The Kimberley Regional Group supported the WALGA position which is to:

- Provide in principle support for the development of new, updated regulations under the Public Health Act 2016 (as opposed to withdrawal of the regulations without replacement or mirroring the existing regulations for the new Act).
- Reject the proposal for Local government to become the enforcement Agency, replacing the Department of Health (based on lack of resourcing to undertake that role).
- Opposes the removal of licensing exemptions for Local Government employees
 (the preferred option of the DOH is to license all operators of local and State
 government whether employed directly or indirectly as contractors ie, each
 worker would need to be licensed rather than the current situation where they
 need to abide by OSH/Duty of Care requirements. This could have significant cost
 and administrative implications as well as impact on workforce availability).

The Kimberley Regional Group (KRG) submission expressed the concerns of the group in relation to the underpinning assumption being the existence of a functioning market that can readily adapt to changes in taxation arrangements. This is not the case in remote and very remote communities which suffer extreme isolation along with social and economic challenges.

Significant changes to the Tax Concessions may mean services will either need to be cut or additional State and Federal government funds will need to be applied to address the gap. This would seem to be less efficient than a non-reportable tax exemption.

The final study report is to be handed to the Australian Government in February 2020 and publicly released shortly after.

SUMMARY: A submission was prepared in for the Select Committee on the Effectiveness of the Australian Government's Northern Australia Agenda.

BACKGROUND

On 4 July 2019 the Senate agreed to the establishment of the Select Committee on the effectiveness of the Australian Government's Northern Australia agenda. The intent is to inquire into and report on the effectiveness of the objectives, design, implementation and evaluation of the Australian Government's Northern Australia agenda, with reference to:

- a. facilitation of public and private investment in infrastructure and economic development;
- b. economic and social benefit arising from that investment for Northern Australians, in particular First Nations people;
- c. funding models and policy measures that capture the full value of existing and emerging industries;
- d. measures taken to develop an appropriately skilled workforce;
- e. emerging national and international trends and their impact on the Northern Australia agenda; and
- f. any related matters.

The committee is due to report on the last sitting day of 2020. Submissions were due by Friday 20 September 2019.

COMMENT

A submission was prepared and noted that, whilst there is broad agreement that the Northern Australia Agenda has delivered a vitally important focus on the opportunities for this previously neglected region, there has been little progress on unpacking the

complex issues that predated the initiative. This has led to a focus on those locations that were in a position to leverage the additional funding and opportunities being made available whilst some of the most disadvantaged areas became further marginalised.

The submission noted the need to establish the basic level of service and opportunity that should be available to all Australians, including Australian businesses, not just those in larger urban centres.

Further, consideration should be given to strategies to mitigate the extreme economic contractions and equally unsustainable periods of expansion that occur in many regional areas.
